dynamic body that changes as well. The one thing that does not change however, is God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. For God is already perfect and therefore, has no need of change. Loaves and fishes, as you know, were what one person had when Jesus was surrounded with five thousand men and additionally, the women and children who were with them. You know of this story of how those few things in the hands of the savior proved to be more than enough. So, what are this congregations' loaves and fishes?

First, we should recognize that we give to God in many ways. And we also acknowledge that we are called to give in sacrificial ways. Normally, this is the place where people stop reading, or put the article down and walk away, because the word sacrifice sounds so ominous or scary. BUT IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE THAT WAY. To give an example of the simplicity of sacrificial giving, I will share a story with you that happened years ago.

When I came to the Lutheran church, people of that congregation noticed my knowledge of scripture and that knowledge came from having a Christian family and being raised in the church. When the pastor of our little congregation resigned his call to accept another call from God, I was shocked, for I had just begun to discern God's call for me to become a minister. As the congregation moved forward, they asked if I would be in the call committee. I accepted and was appointed chaplain of the committee.

We spoke to several candidates and participated in Holy conversations with them. Eventually, we were led by the Spirit to one particular candidate. The only challenge in this was the pastor had many years of experience and to call them would require and increase of \$7000 dollars a year!

When we spoke to the church council, a retired banker immediately said there was no way that this could happen. I replied that if God is truly leading us in our search, and that the committee believed that God was, that a solution would be found. The banker disagreed.

I then did a little math.

In the Lutheran church we have what is referred to as the 3 C's; confirmed, contributing, and communing members. These are the three requirements within a congregation to have a vote and voice in congregational meetings. I looked at how many 3C members attended church on an average Sunday. I then subtracted 20 from that number to give a buffer or "wiggle room." Then I took the number, 7000 and divided it by the remaining number to see how much each person would have to give to make this call a possibility.

Finally, I took that total per person and divided it by 52 Sundays, knowing that there were more services throughout the year than this. I finally reached the amount of money that each person would have to put in the plate to make this possible, it was only 50 cents!

When I presented this to the council, they were shocked and elated at the same time. "This is doable!" they said. "That's less than a bottle of coke!" said another. Suddenly, what seemed unreachable became possible and yes, we did call that pastor.

SACRIFICE does not have to be HUGE to be blessed by God! Nor does it have to break your personal bank account.

As prices rise in your personal lives, they also are rising in the life of the church. And as the body of Christ, Jesus depends upon us to keep the doors open, but MORE IMPORTANTLY, the ministry happening! For it is ministry that our Lord Jesus called us to do. So that all the world will know that JESUS IS LORD!

While there has been some unhelpful language used in reference to budgets or ministry investment plans, there should be a very simple understanding about this. A budget is nothing more than a wish list of things we would like to happen. What matters is what is actually given, for we continue ministry and operate within the parameters of the gifts received from the people of God. If it ever came to the point where the gifts were not enough to continue, the congregation would close its doors. It's not more complicated than that.

But rather than thinking about or even focusing on such a troubling thought, I wish to go on record as saying that this congregation is truly amazing and a blessing from Almighty God. What you do is awesome and your love for God and your neighbors is remarkable.

But how do we fill the so called "gaps" in giving you might ask? The answer is simple. Do the math. On a good Sunday we have around 60 people in our congregation. We know that many of them are children who we are so blessed to have. So, we could subtract 10 from the 60, arriving at 50.

Let's say we wanted to increase giving by \$15,000 a year. We divide that by 50, arriving at \$300 per year per person. Then we divide that by 52 Sundays a year, arriving at \$5.7692 or \$5.77 per week, per person. Folks, to quote that council member from so long ago, THIS IS DOABLE!

So, how does that work? It works like this. Consider how many times you may eat out or buy something for yourself each week. Even eating at a fast-food establishment cost one person more than \$5.77. What happens if we choose to skip that one meal and eat at home instead? And then we place what we would have spent on the meal in the offering plate. At this point the once insurmountable amount becomes little when we all share in this ministry together.

Now I know there are those who might say, "Pastor, I can do more than \$5.77 a week." Then do as Christ leads you. If you can increase by \$20 a week, then it will ease the burden on those who might struggle to put the \$5.77 in the plate. Also, keep in mind that if we give twice what our goal is then the \$15,000 can become \$30,000. And all of that will be used for the growth of the Kingdom of God and continued

Singing Has Many Benefits



I am certain that we all know of the many verses in the Bible that encourage singing. For example:

Psalm 105:1–2
Oh give thanks to the LORD;

call upon his name;

make known his deeds among the peoples!
Sing to him, sing praises to him; tell of all his wondrous works!

Colossians 3:16

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God.

James 5:13

Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise.

But did you know that singing is very beneficial to our health? Singing improves breathing, posture, and



muscle tension. It also increases oxygenation in the blood, regulates blood pressure, and reduces heart rate variability.

Singing can help reduce stress and anxiety by releasing endorphins and oxytocin. It can also improve mood and feelings of loneliness and depression.

Singing can help strengthen the immune system by reducing cortisol, the stress hormone, and increasing immunoglobulin A antibodies. Singing can help with pain relief.

Singing activates many areas of the brain, including the midline and cerebellum. It can also help improve memory and cognitive stimulation.

Singing can boost confidence and selfesteem, especially when learning a new skill or being part of a group.

Singing is a mindful activity that can help you focus on the moment and distract your mind from negative thoughts.

Singing activates the vagus nerve, which connects the brain, heart, lungs, and gut. This can help with resting, digestion, and calming down.
