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for signs that He might come. And they understood that the coming king would appear in the form of a helpless infant. Again, this was not their expectation but one that was given from God.

Finally, there were shepherds who lived among their flocks. They were considered lowly in the grand scheme of things. For as cities and villages developed, they lived apart from these places by necessity. For their focus was not upon themselves, but upon the flock with which they were entrusted. Does this sound familiar? It should. And again, the expectation they came to hold for the one born in a manger was not their own but one that was given by God.

Are you seeing a pattern develop? Yes, it is intentional. For in this season of anticipation of the one to come, it is a wonderful opportunity to consider our expectations. Expectations are considered as common as humanity itself. But have you ever considered what expectations truly are and what they are about? Or maybe I should say who they are about?

Lutherans have long been people who supported education and valued knowledge. After all, Martin Luther was actually Dr. Martin Luther. Humans seek understanding of the world in which we live and part of that desire is to focus upon the questions of where we come from, how did we come to be, who our creator is

As we search for meaning to our lives and existence, we turn to the one who was sent to this world so many years ago and to his teachings.

Our Lord's teachings are all incredibly valuable to us as it leads us in the way of righteousness. And when walking in this way our lives experience a peace that passes all understanding. In other words, the peace that we experience in spite of the situations and challenges that may come doesn't make sense to this world.

Jesus wanted us to have that peace now. For that peace is only possible by completely trusting and following him. As the original Greek states in the gospel according to John, we believe into Him, believe into Christ. We become like Christ. One of the principal teachings of Jesus is not to judge. Yeah, right! We might think. But there is a really good reason that Jesus tells us this. First of all, we never have all of the knowledge about any situation that occurs in life. And to judge something properly we would need that information to be accurate in our understanding. This is why the book of James tells us that there is one lawgiver and one judge. James continues by saying, "Who then are we, that we should judge?" In other words, God is the only judge for it is God and God alone who knows everything. We simply do not.

But what does this have to do with expectations you may ask? Simply this. Expectations that we hold are often, if not always, focused upon our own points of view or how we think things should be.

So, hopefully, the question that you now are considering is why would we think that things would be the way we want them to be? If you are thinking in this way, you are certainly correct. For we are not God. We are subjects of Christ our King and creations of God the Father. And this is why Jesus

taught us to pray the way that He did, when speaking to God we say, thy kingdom come, thy will be done. You notice that it is not my will, but God's will. Our prayer is not that the world fulfills our expectations, but God's expectations. And when it comes to knowing the way of God, we are still learning and hopefully, constantly learning about our creator.

So, what does it look like to walk through our days without expectations? Imagine it, if you will. Facing each day seeing things as they are rather than how we want them to be. Accepting others and ourselves as we are and recognizing that we all are on a journey of learning about God, about life, about ourselves. And like the disciples following Jesus, none of us get all things right. And even thought this is true, God doesn't give up on us. One of the beautiful things of following Christ in this way is that we no longer give up on each other.

What does it look like? It looks peaceful. It looks kind. It looks like understanding. This truly is a gift from God from the greatest gift from the Father that any of us have ever received. This looks like Jesus.




Advent to Christmas

The Church has been a place where the beloved of God have come for millennia to worship and encounter the presence of our Lord. And with this tradition it has always been rich in symbolism with icons, stained glass windows, paraments, and in this season, Chrismon's that orient us towards that unseen God and the son who is the very image of the Father.

While reflecting upon this I consider the many other symbols that we have through our lives that also convey messages and meanings. As you decorate your homes for this Christmas season I am sure that you will do as I have in the past, opening boxes that have been stored that not only contain ornaments and decorations, but so many memories. Some were gifts from special people in our lives, some were made by our children or grandchildren when they were small. We don't only see the objects, but we see the persons and hear their voices and laughter with the eyes of our hearts.

This Advent and Christmas season you will notice two small additions to the church's decorations, two small Christmas trees that come from my past serving God. The first one is very small, but comes from a very powerful time in my life. While in seminary, as you may know, I was presented with some very difficult times and decisions. Through this time I surrendered my home, my land, my savings, and ultimately, my family. These things were not my idea of what following Jesus would ever look like, but for me, this is what happened. Yet, through the difficulty the Lord showed me a greater understanding of His teaching and when I hear the words of St. Peter, "Lord, we have left everything for you," it brings a richer meaning to my heart.

The things that were happening in my life were shared with my sisters and

brothers in Christ who were also preparing for the ministry and give them cause to ask questions of themselves. How dedicated are we all to following? How far would we go? Can we walk in the path of the widow who gave two small coins?

One of my brothers who had given up his profession as a medical doctor was also searching his soul as he followed. While I was away help-

ing my brother's in their studies he left something in the doorway of my dorm room, a small tree with an angel of silver on it. With it he had written a note. No one should face Christmas without a Christmas tree. I



was overwhelmed when I found it and understood that Christ was already giving me what He desired for my life rather that what my desires were.

In my first congregation as pastor there was a lovely 90 year old lady who was always very considerate and kind. One day she called her pastor saying, "Pastor, I'm not bothering you am I?" This gave me the opportunity to use one of my favorite phrases. "Jesus sent me here for you." She had questions about scripture that she had been reading about. I encouraged her to keep a piece of paper beside her Bible so she could write down her questions. Through our faith journey together I learned about front porch ministry. I would go over to her house on occasion and we would sit on her front porch in a glider. We would talk about Jesus, the Bible, we would pray and watch the birds come to her feeders.

The Lord teaches us to ask, and you shall receive. Seek, and you will find. Knock, and it will be opened unto you. Betty had learned the value of taking that initiative to seek to be closer to Jesus. She had learned the treasure of intentional faith. We remained friends through the years and her faith began to fail. I would visit her in the home that she had to move to and watched as she continually encountered

others while learning more about Jesus.

As she neared the end of her time here I would visit. Her eyes were already fixed and her breathing was labored. Her daughter stood in front of her face while I came up behind her calling her name. Her daughter cried and I looked up at her and she said, "Momma smiled!" The night came when I received a call around 1 a.m. from her son saying momma has passed. When I arrived at the nursing home. She was in her bed and covered. Beside her was her angel tree. A Christmas tree filled with angels. It was beside her casket during her funeral and her children said

they felt it should remain with me.

I have carried both these trees through my time as a pastor and thought I would share them with the congregation by adding them to



the decorations. But I also wanted you to not just see the trees, but know the stories of Jason and Betty, who followed the Lord.
